Paul Robeson is one of the foremost leaders of the Negro people and a concert artist of world renown. He has been chairman of the Council on African Affairs since the formation of that vital organization 12 years ago. In the summer of 1949 he returned from a four-month speaking and concert tour which took this beloved spokesman of the Negro people to eight countries of Europe, including the Soviet Union. While in Europe he participated as an honored guest in the celebration of the Pushkin centennial anniversary in Moscow, and in the World Peace Congress in Paris.

A world-wide storm of indignation greeted the storm-troop attacks upon him at Peekskill, N.Y.

The text of this pamphlet is an address delivered by Mr. Robeson at a banquet sponsored by the National Council of American-Soviet Friendship at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, in New York, on November 10, 1949, on the occasion of the celebration of the 32nd anniversary of the Soviet Union.
